



Hanging Your Floating Shelf



Step 1. Using a tape measure or ruler, measure down from the top of the shelf to the top of the hole on the keyhole hanger. Do the same for the other side just in case there are discrepancies. Take note of your measurements.



Step 2. Lay a piece of tape across the back making sure you are aligned with the top of the shelf and covering the keyhole hangers. Press firmly near the keyhole hangers.



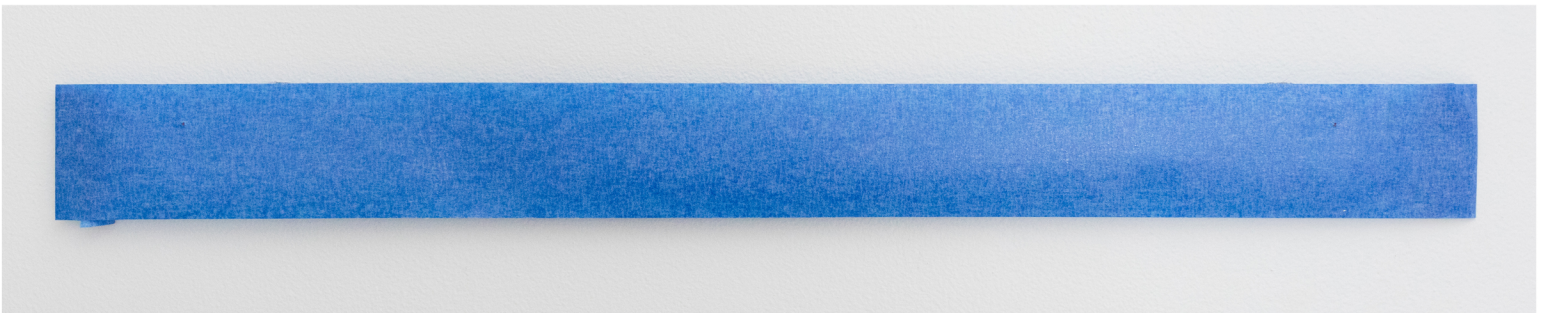
Step 3. Using a tape measure or ruler, find the middle of the keyhole hanger and make a mark using your measurement from earlier. Once you remove the ruler or tape measure, double check to make sure you are centered side to side and poke a hole using a pen or other pointy object.



Step 4. Using a level (or a really good eye) and a pencil, make a few small marks where your shelf will hang. This will also ensure you apply the tape straight on the wall (next step).



Step 5. Fold over the ends of the tape to make the non-sticky side sticky. Remove the tape and stick your folded edges to the wall using your marks as a guide. Find the holes you made in the tape and mark your holes on the wall with a pen/pencil/marker.



Step 6. Remove the tape to expose your marks on the wall where the screws will go. If you are going into a wall stud, you will need to remove the anchors from the screws and use a drill. If you are going through sheetrock only, use a hammer and screwdriver. Hammer the screw and anchor into the sheetrock. Using a screwdriver, tighten the screw all the way before backing out the screw. You will need a small gap between the screw and wall to slip the keyhole hangers on. Once both screws are in, you are ready to slip on your shelf! If the shelf wiggles at all, tighten the screws a little bit at a time until it sits well.



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
